Rural crime alert

Police have appealed to communities in our area to remain vigilant following a spate of rural burglaries in the area.

The attacks, which have targeted outbuildings, insecure barns and sheds have occurred across the region during the night. Tools, farm machinery, and diesel are just some of the items which have been stolen, and Crime Prevention Officers are urging residents to use some simple security measures in order to reduce the risk towards their property.

People have been advised to ensure that all outbuildings are locked when not in use, and to use weatherproof padlocks and to reverse the hinges on shed doors so that they cannot be unscrewed. Residents are also reminded to lock tools and machinery away and out of sight when not in use as not only could they be at risk of theft but tools can be used to gain access to surrounding buildings. Other advice is not to leave keys or valuables in farm vehicles/machinery, to always keep gates padlocked shut and make sure all tools and valuables are security marked and warning signs placed around properties to deter potential thieves.

Officers are conducting extra patrols in these areas to provide reassurance to victims and communities. To assist the police in their efforts to catch these criminals, residents in rural areas are being asked to be extra vigilant and to report any suspicious activity or vehicles they see.

Ticket and Online Booking Fraud

With summer holidays fast approaching, individuals are often more exposed to travel booking frauds when looking for last minute package deals / cheap flights. Whether paying upfront for a family holiday or simply booking a flight, payments are transferred only to discover that the holiday / airline ticket does not exist and was sold to you by a bogus travel company. Fraudsters will often lure in potential customers with low prices and 'one time only' offers that are simply too good to pass up, requesting payment by the preferred method of direct bank transfer.

Avoid

Paying for a holiday / airline tickets / accommodation via direct bank transfer. No reputable company will ever request payment via this method.

Responding to unsolicited calls, texts or emails offering holidays at incredibly low prices.
